In September Miss. Price, Mr. Oldroyd and Mrs. Gallagher completed a half marathon trek through the Cotswolds (*and the rain!*) all in aid of raising funds for the breast cancer awareness charity **CoppaFeel!** Between them they raised **over £1500!** A definite test of resilience but a wonderful accomplishment to raise money for the charity, which aims to educate and empower young people with knowledge and confidence to know their 'normal' and to advocate for their own health.



Periods aren't easy!

Girls can start their periods between the ages of 8 -17 but it all depend on the person. The world bank estimates that over 500 million young women and girls globally struggle daily to manage their menstrual health. Access to period products, education, and safe facilities remains a persistent challenge for many, preventing their full participation in school, work, and their overall wellbeing.



Our bodies are constantly changing and with periods, especially, you might never know when your period will come and wether you will be prepared. However, our school offers period products and advice everywhere!

She has been working hard completing surveys of students and staff, checking the building's facilities and access, delivering presentations to SLT and making posters to display around the school.

Jess is making a real difference in our school community and empowering young girls and women to not feel ashamed about their bodies but to feel confident and speak out if they're struggling.

"Our school is launching a Period Positive Campaign to help break the stigma around periods and make sure every student feels informed, supported, and comfortable. The campaign will include age-appropriate education, open conversations, and improved access to period products in school. Our goal is to create an environment where periods are seen as normal and nothing to be embarrassed about. By promoting understanding and inclusivity, we hope to empower all students and ensure that no one's learning or wellbeing is affected by something so natural."

"I was inspired to start this campaign after a personal experience in class when my period leaked and it was not handled in the right way. That moment made me realise how important it is for schools to talk openly and supportively about periods. I hope this campaign will spark change across our school and encourage no one to feel uncomfortable around the topic of periods"

Earlier this month our Year 7s had the opportunity to visit Avebury – an ancient, Neolithic landscape and stone circle just outside of Swindon. All this term in their History, Geography and RE lessons, our newest additions to the Deanery community have been learning about this mysterious and special place, and exploring theories about why it might have been built, who lived there and how it connects people to their spiritual selves and nature. Half of the year group visited on the Tuesday and the other half went on the Wednesday and we were almost blessed with the weather, until we got slightly damp on the Wednesday! We completed a range of activities whilst we were there, including: visiting the Alexander Killier Museum with Miss Price (*History*); Visiting the stone circle and completing a traffic survey with Mr. Niel (*Geography*); Spending time in St James' church and the grounds with Mrs. Gallagher (*RE*); and then walking a mini pilgrimage across the landscape with Rev. Owen.

Our students made the staff exceptionally proud as they displayed impeccable manners, were polite and enthusiastic, and we even had members of the public comment on how lovely our students are. They really did proudly display our school values in the community! Careers Education, Information & Guidance programme

Welcome to the Term 1 Careers section! This term has been packed with exciting opportunities for our students to explore future career paths and develop essential skills

Y8 & Y9 Careers Insight Morning at Travis Perkins

Fifteen students from Years 8 and 9 participated in a challenge morning at Travis Perkins in Swindon. They explored careers in the construction industry and front-of-house roles including business, HR, and support functions. Students toured a kitchen design studio, learned about CAD (Computer-Aided Design), and heard inspiring career stories from staff across the company.

Y9 Online Talk from Anglian Windows

In September, some Year 9 students attended an online talk hosted by Anglian Windows. They learned about apprenticeship opportunities and the wide range of roles available within the company.

Y8 Scrap Challenge

Last week, all Year 8 students took part in a Scrap Challenge where they built environmentally friendly cities using recycled materials. The event encouraged creativity, collaboration, and teamwork. Business volunteers from the STEM sector supported the event, making it a great success.

Cirencester College Visit

Safeguarding

As we approach the end of the first term of this academic year, we have become aware that the technical and digital world we live in is quickly evolving.

With the emergence of AI, it carries both advantages and disadvantages. AI will play a significant role in the future lives of your children, whether they use it directly or not.

The solution will not lie in banning children and young people from this technology, but instead, in implementing safety measures to protect them. Whilst we may automatically focus on the risks, it is important when talking with children, that we also discuss the positive impact AI can have and the ways it can be used to help us.

A Safeguarding assembly has been delivered to all year groups this term, focusing on the risks of social media and keeping yourself safe online.

We have recently been made aware from Wiltshire Police, that a large group of children appear to have been added to a WhatsApp group chat with the title 'SKIBIDI'. In this chat, two unknown people have been sending inappropriate images. All individuals within the chat appear to be under 16 but this cannot currently be confirmed.

The majority of the pupils within the chat appear to attend local Swindon schools inclusive of The Deanery, but no further details are known and no specific children identified.

This investigation will be ongoing to try and identify individual involvement, but please can parents and carers monitor their children's social media and notify a member of the safeguarding team at school should new information emerge.

Students will be given one free and will be expected to take responsibility of their fiddle toy by ensuring the item is in school and used appropriately in lessons. Supporting Your Child's Mental Health – A Parent's Guide

Mental health is just as important as physical health, and as children grow, they may face emotional challenges that can affect their wellbeing. Whether it's anxiety, low mood, friendship issues, or stress, your support can make a huge difference.

Talk and Listen

- Create a safe space for your child to share how they're feeling.
- Listen without judgment and reassure them that it's okay to feel overwhelmed sometimes.

Build Healthy Habits

- Encourage regular sleep, balanced meals, and physical activity.
- Help them develop coping strategies like journaling, breathing exercises, or creative outlets.



Stay Connected

- Keep in touch with school staff and check in on how your child is doing socially and emotionally.
- Reach out to professionals if you notice persistent changes in mood or behaviour.
